Flying Mother Lode Chapter Clinic Report - June, 2017

Primary Care Clinic

Chris Nelson flew Dianne VanOrder, Maria Boyd & Rose French, the latter two being teachers who are both fluent in Spanish; they both previously attended clinic. They flew to



clinic on Thursday so that Dianne could remove an excess of outdated supplies and take other materials to Buen Pastor Hospital. **Joel Prosser** flew **Pam Polk**, **Bob Haining** & me on Friday. **Sunny Sethi** flew **Pam Fallo**, **Margie Wilson** & **Nora Feddal**; he had to file IFR to get in and out of Whiteman when he picked Nora up. All lights encountered head winds with some turbulence. **Joe Zachwieja** drove **Ann Ivory** & **Andrea Powell**. En route, these three ate street tacos in San Quintin, and several of us joined them when we passed them on our way to town. Several others stayed at the hotel for dinner.

Saturday was very busy at both the medical & eye clinics with people eagerly enjoying the freebies passed out by Chris & his workers. Pam Fallo, Bob Haining & I saw the usual variety of patients. Bob saw a young girl of about 8 years who was

self-mutilating by biting and chewing on her arms, a real nightmare for the mother. Bob gave the mother some meds for the girl to try to control her actions and some meds to induce sleep. We expect to see her next month for more meds with no end in sight. Bob saw a preemie who visited us last month because of an inability to tolerate formula. She was placed on goat's milk, which controlled the diarrhea, and she did gain some weight. Unfortunately, the goat farmer was forced to give all of the milk to the cheese manufacturer he works for, so the baby was returned to normal formula and the diarrhea recurred. Dianne will try to find an expensive formula for the baby, which Bob recommended for infants with special needs. Pam Fallo was especially active treating a variety of problems. I injected my first knee in a 70-year-old lady, hoping to give her some relief for her arthritis.

Pam Polk had a very able assistant this month in Dalia Navarete who helped with intake. She is a college student who lives in San Quintin and is planning to return next month.

Unfortunately, we have lost contact with Flor and have not seen her in over eight months. Our care was mostly providing vitamins and a daily prophylactic antibiotic which was recommended by a pediatric cardiologist for her abnormal cardiovascular system. A prediction by one of her doctors was that entering puberty was going to be the kiss of death – she is now almost 11 years old.

It is difficult to describe the activities and give credit to all who contribute to the care of the people of San Quintin. Suffice it to say that each volunteer personally recognizes his or her efforts to help the patients, which is what brings them back to the next clinic.

Chris will write a separate report on the eye clinic, which was incredibly busy. He left early Sunday morning and returned home safely. We in Joel's plane returned Sunday, experiencing strong head winds; it took 4 hours from Calexico to Stockton. Heidi Prosser, Joel's wife, was in Stockton on business and Joel decided to leave his plane there because of the threat of thunderstorms in the Placerville area. He and Heidi graciously drove me home. Sunny was able to drop his passengers off and returned Tracy in trying conditions. All of this was unbelievable weather for June.

The current system of allowing people to visit our website and if interested, sign up to attend a clinic regardless of where they live places stress on Joel to provide them with air transportation. Suggestions are in order and the Board welcomes your thoughts.

Flying Sam's Surgery Clinic Buen Pastor Hospital

This story began shortly after our return from the June 9-11 clinic in San Quintin.

I received a call from Sunny Sethi, one of the pilots for the Gold

Coast Chapter, who had also just returned from the June 9 clinic, asking if I knew a pilot who would be willing to fly to the surgery clinic the next weekend, June 16-18. I assured him that either I would recruit a pilot or I would fly myself.

After all, Sunny had flown when I needed a pilot. I could do no less for him.

Mother Lode Chapter pilot Phil Lancaster agreed to fly the following Friday. Since I had flown to clinic the previous weekend, I was happy I wouldn't be going this time.

Everything seemed to be going well until I received a call from Tony, the other scheduled Gold Coast pilot, stating one of his pax had a passport due to expire in about 45 days. He informed me Mexico wanted at least six months remaining on the passport before it expired. Tony called the authorities and seemed to have solved that issue, only to discover his own medical had expired in May.

Because we pilots cannot fly without meeting proper medical requirements, he would be unable to fly his pax to the surgery clinic. I then called Dr. Satya Arya, one of the surgeons, to ask him if the pax who were to fly with Tony were indispensable to the operation of the clinic. He assured me everything could and would be done as planned regardless.

About the same time Phil called to say his wife was having surgery on Thursday and he would not be flying after all. Ouch!

At that point my decision had been made for me.

The day before departure I had a large boil drained from under my left arm pit. I refused any medication that could affect my ability to fly, and filed my flight plans both to and from Mexico and the US.

My plan was to depart Sacramento Executive Airport at 7 am local time; then on to Bakersfield for Sara Stark, RN; followed by a stop at Carlsbad-Palomar in Southern California for Satya Pal Arya and Shrilekha Champaneri, MDs.

I was in the air at 7 am. It was a beautiful morning as I climbed up from the airport. Suddenly, I was unable to hear Nor Cal Departure through my headset. I then returned to the airport and to Airborne Electronics located on the airport. They quickly isolated the problem and restored my ability to communicate with Air Traffic Control, though I couldn't talk to or hear my pax. Perhaps that may have been considered a blessing!

The stops at Bakersfield and Carlsbad-Palomar were both made in good VFR weather conditions, as was the stop in Ensenada. There we cleared Customs and Immigration, refueled and flew on to Los Pinos, our regular clinic site.

The surgery team left Los Pinos immediately for Buen Pastor Hospital. This dedicated trio worked the remainder of the day Friday and into the evening hours.

On Saturday morning the surgeries began shortly after 8:30.

I was invited into the operating room after donning surgical garb. I stood behind Dr. Arya, watching over his shoulder as he removed tonsils from a 19-year-old female patient. The operation was inspiring to watch as the skilled surgeon performed his work.

I brought tacos, sodas and water for lunch and left to visit a family Heidi and I had "adopted" years before. The family is as poor as the proverbial church mice. Their 14 year-old daughter, who had been in a wheel chair for years, died two years ago. It was a heart-rending time for all.

The surgeries continued until 11 pm. The medical team was determined to take care of all who were scheduled.

I have been a part of the Flying Samaritans since 1995. During those years it has been my privilege to come to know men and women of dedication and selflessness, people who live their lives in service to others.

This past weekend I believe I observed the pinnacle of this dedication. These medics have traveled to other countries of the world performing surgeries at no cost to the patients. On Friday and Saturday they continued this amazing work.

I'm thankful as well as humbled to have been a part of this wonderful team. May God continue to use and bless them.

The total number of patients seen was well over 150 with nearly 100 exams using the Auto Refractor. Only one pair of glasses was ordered as a result of the exams. The remainder were fitted on the spot using our inventory. In addition we gave out 37 pairs of readers and 7 pairs of glasses ordered from months prior. We also distributed approximately 200 pairs of sunglasses including those that were in the Backpacks given to children. The children's sunglasses were a big hit as many of the recipients had never had the opportunity to own a pair in the past and the styles were current and "cool" with themes that they could relate to such as Spiderman for the boys.

The optical clinic ran very efficiently, thanks to **Margie Wilson** who acted as the Optical Team's coach as well as being the focal point for fitting patients with the appropriate prescription and style of glasses. Both **Ann Ivory** as well as **Andrea Powell** worked hard all day in the fitting area. This function requires a significant amount of time, effort and care to ensure that each patient leaves with the appropriate vision solution. Great Job!!!
